Walstonburg PTA Hears Principal

Principal J. R. Peeler of the Walstonburg High School gave an interesting talk on various phases of parent-child relations when the P.T.A. held its first meeting of the year last Thursday. After the meeting was called to order by the president, Henry Burch, an impressive devotion was conducted by Marilu Burch. Mrs. A. J. Craft, secretary, read the minutes and they were approved by the group. Mr. Burch announced that the various committees for last term would be retained for the present term. Miss Ellis resigned as Program Chairman and Mrs. Henrietta Williamson was appointed as her successor. Earl Lang, treasurer, reported no funds in the treasury except for the \$700 Reserve Fund.

After a discussion on the tobacco contest, the organization voted to allow the students to sponsor the contest. It was agreed that it is a student project and the proceeds should go into the school treasury instead of the P.T.A. treasury. In his remarks to the group, Mr. Peeler stated that the child's attitude toward school and home life is an important factor in his development. He emphasized the necessity for parents to make their children feel secure and at the same time teach them to accept responsibility for their duties. He also explained some misunderstandings that might arise in connection with homework, report cards, music programs, athletics, and other school activities. He stated that parents and other people outside school often do the child much harm by giving him untruths about school life.

Mr. Burch asked the parents to subscribe to the Nation Parent-Teacher magazine and the North Carolina Parent-Teacher Bulletin. He explained that both publications give helpful information concerning the home and school. After the meeting adjourned, delicious refreshments were served by Mrs. Sam Jenkins and Mrs. M. V. Redick. The monthly meetings are held the first Thursday in each month.

At The Rotary Club

H. A. Hendrix, from the Greenville Office of the State Department of Public Instruction, Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, was guest speaker at the Rotary Club Tuesday night and explained the activities of his Department as related to the handicapped of the State. The program, a State-Federal public service, was introduced as a legal right and is much more comprehensive in its scope than generally understood. Although Mr. Hendrix's office is interested primarily in the rehabilitation of people of working age, provisions are made for children too, and he pointed out that under the present set-up, there is no real reason for anyone to go through life in a physically handicapped condition.

Nation's Third Highest Award Given Sgt. Owens

Master Sergeant Edward J. Owens of Farmville has been awarded the Silver Star Medal, the nation's third highest decoration, for gallantry in action in Korea. Sergeant Owens, whose wife is the former Reid Russell, serves with Company "E" of the 7th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Division. He was awarded previously the Bronze Star Medal with "V" device for heroism in action. The North Carolina serviceman was cited for action which occurred April 24-25, 1951, near Taegon-ni, Korea, where he discovered upon returning from a reconnaissance mission that a group of enemy soldiers had infiltrated the area between himself and his platoon. The platoon was engaged already in a firefight with other enemy elements, so Sergeant Owens singlehandedly engaged the hostile troops. He exhausted his supply of ammunition, then began hurling hand grenades into the attacker's ranks. The citation points out that his quick action accounted for ten enemy dead and an unknown number wounded.

The citation states: "Sergeant Owens' gallantry, indomitable courage and selfless determination reflect great credit upon himself and the military service." Sgt. Owens was returned from Korea. He and his family have been visiting Mr. Owens' mother, Mrs. Mary Russell. The Enterprise last week had an article about the Owens' family.
