

School Principal Stresses Need For Another Building

Sam D. Bundy gave an informative report on the present crowded conditions that prevail in the High School, at the Parent-Teacher meeting on Thursday night.

Bundy, principal of the school, appealed to members present to make a mind's eye view of the present enrollment of the school, 774 children, all housed and taught in one block.

He said he knew many citizens wondered why children could be seen on the school grounds for many hours during the day. He explained that he had to rotate recesses and lunch periods from 10 o'clock in the morning until after 1 o'clock, in order to avoid accidents that could be caused by congestion.

Mr. Bundy estimated that 98 new students will go into high school next year—around 80 coming from Fountain and other vicinities. Approximately 50 will be graduated in 1952.

The high school library, considered good in the past, was made too small last year because a room had to be constructed out of one end of it. Students seeking a reference book unavoidably stumble over others because of the crowded conditions.

Art classes, recently begun by Mrs. E. P. Bass, meet in the balcony of the auditorium.

In the elementary grades the situation is even more alarming. The first grade enrollment of 66 children, this year, made it necessary for the two teachers each to have an enrollment of 33; and a large pre-school group will enroll next year.

There is money for the needed building, \$70,000, district's share of the State Bond issue, but there is no suitable site for sale.

Escaper Flees In Stolen School Bus And Worker's Auto

John W. Carter, a Greensboro A-grader, prisoner, serving a five to ten year sentence for attempted robbery, escaped from a road gang near the Cobbleville section, Monday. Carter was one of a work gang cutting a right-of-way through a patch of woods. Suddenly he made a break and was soon out of sight in the foliage. The guard hardly had a chance to know what was going on.

Elbert Crawford, student driver for the Bell Arthur School had just made his last stop and had parked his bus in the yard of his home, which is located on the farm of W. L. White. He didn't know that Carter was on the loose and left the key in the ignition.

Carter headed toward Farmville and five miles away on the Greenville Highway, near the site where the O. G. Spell home is being constructed, he abandoned the bus and stole a car belonging to a carpenter named Lee. He drove the car to Kinston, where it ran out of gas; he abandoned that car and stole car No. 2.

Bloodhounds were set on the trail of the prisoner at the White farm but the scent was lost when the man entered the school bus. Efforts are still being made to apprehend the prisoner.

Town May Put Cop On Motorcycle To Chase Speedsters

The perennial problem of speedsters, and what to do about them, was brought to the attention of the town board at a recent meeting and Mayor Walter Jones echoed the fears of many local citizens when he expressed the fear that Farmville's fine safety record would be marred with fatal accidents unless some effective way was found to enforce traffic laws.

Different sections of town were pointed out as favorite "speed-ways" of motorists. These danger zones include the eastern extension of Wilson street, Greensboro, Main street, and the Fountain highway. Commissioner John Stanall mentioned that the warnings near the school, on Main street, simply served as a stimulus for motorists heading northward.

The officials seemed pretty well in agreement that the most effective method of nabbing these violators—and getting enough evidence to obtain a conviction in court—would be to have a patrol car or motorcycle constantly on the move, or stationed at strategic points, ready to pounce on speedsters.

Chief of Police L. T. Lucas told the board that one of his men could be given the title of traffic officer if the Commissioners would purchase a motorcycle. He said that this duty could be assumed without increasing the personnel of his department.

With the board's approval, Mayor Jones named a committee to investigate the feasibility of purchasing a motorcycle, preferably a used machine, and turning it over to the police department for an intensive campaign against reckless drivers.
