

Premium List For '52 Fair Sets New Record: \$3750 in Prize Money for Exhibitors

Big preparations are being made by the Pitt County Agricultural Fair for the annual event which will be staged in Greenville October 6-11, according to information received from J. Howard Moye of Greenville, president, and Norman Y. Chambliss, manager.

\$3,750 is being offered by the 1952 fair for agricultural exhibits, and this is the largest amount ever to be offered to agricultural interests and leaders by a county fair. The new and up-to-date fairgrounds at Greenville will be used for the second year. It is adjacent to the airport, provides a large main exhibit building, an excellent Cattle and Swine Building.

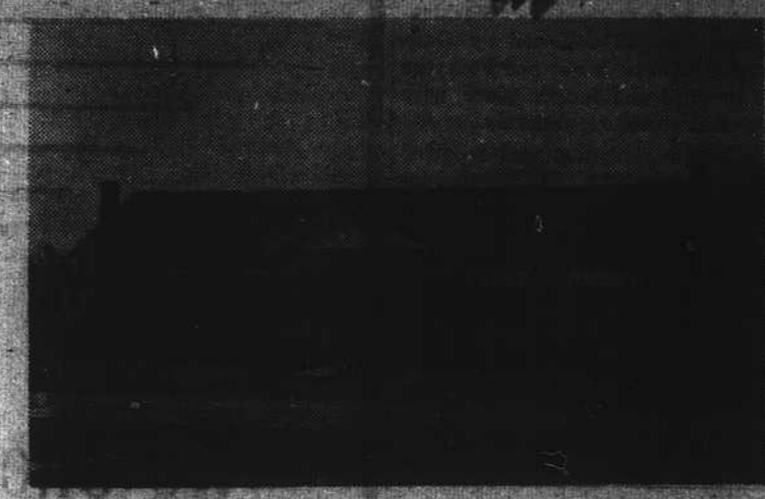

Entire Community Takes Pride In Achievements and Physical Plant of H. B. Sugg High School

Through the friendly co-operation of its citizenship, both white and colored, Farmville has been able to build up a Negro school that in most respects equals and in some respects surpasses any in the state for a community of its population.

The school closed last session with a membership of 640 elementary and 196 high school student. For the coming year it will operate with twenty elementary and seven high school teachers.

The administration has long been cognizant of the very obvious fact

that a very small percentage of its product would be financially able to pursue a profession through a long and expensive college career and that the great majority would have to seek a living by some form of manual labor. Constantly faced with these facts, it long ago began to look forward toward a program that would more nearly meet the old philosophy of the greatest good for the greatest number.

Through fine community co-operation it has developed a program that more nearly meets the needs of both

the students and the community. In addition to the regular college preparatory curriculum it offers training in industrial arts and general carpentry, both theoretical and practical home making, music and computers.

One of the greatest assets of the community is its fine racial relationship. It is generally conceded by those who know about conditions here and elsewhere, that this community

has a racial relationship that is as good as is to be found anywhere.

The most pressing need of the school now is a gymnasium and cafeteria. This need will reasonably soon be met. Plans and specifications for such a building are now being studied.
