GIRL, 15, RELATES ATTACK BY MEN AT OCEAN VIEW

NORFOLK, Va., Aug. 2.—A 15-year-old girl, whose name is withheld by the police today, charged that she was kidnapped at Ocean View Saturday night and attacked by three men. Her charges caused the arrest of John Murray, 19 years old, and he will be tried tomorrow in Ocean View.

The girl was found wandering about the streets Sunday, her clothes torn and her body bearing the marks of bruises. She had taken poison, she told the police, and she was rushed to St. Vincent's Hospital, where immediate treatment saved her life.

The girl said today that she had gone to Ocean View with Louise Hill 21 years old, and had become separated from the woman when three young men dragged her into a place called the Devil's Den, a rude shack used as a clubroom. She declared she was attacked there and could remember nothing else until she was found on the streets by policemen.

She denies that Miss Hill contributed to her trouble, but the latter is being held. The girl has given a partial description of the men who attacked her, and police are after them.

To All Persons Owning Lots on East Ash Street Between Herman Street and East City Limits.
