

### BULGARIAN PREMIER STRONG FOR MASSES

Furnishes Europe Much Amusement By His Defiant Treatment of King Boris

SOPIA, Bulgaria, Sept. 21.—Alexander Stamboullsky, since his advent to power as Bulgaria's peasant-premier, has been furnishing Europe with no little amusement by the unceremonious and defiant way he has been treating King Boris, and by his indifferent attitude toward the ever-present question of repatriation. Not long ago he told the king if he did not do the bidding of the masses, he might find himself without a throne and in the midst of a republic. He added a warning that young Boris must not keep his eye on both sides of the fence; that he could give his support only to one party, and that party the group in power.

The stalwart Agrarian leader also has given voice to equally novel expressions on various questions of the day. "My enemies," he says, "would like to throw me over. But that would not be in conformity with constitutional usage. And then they do not know the king. I have him well trained. I treat him like a son. I have been teaching him politics for three years, and he is quite devoted to me. We are going to amalgamate the Agrarians, Radicals and Social Democrats for the elections of 1924, unless I am assassinated in the meantime.

"I like the Bulgarian Communists," Stamboullsky declares, "because they support me without any engagement on my part, which is convenient for me. The Communists are practical people, and they will shortly become a party fit to govern. They are forgetting their principles more and more, and they know how to accommodate themselves to circumstances. They know how to talk so as to please people."

The Premier says he does not care a snap about reparations. "Reparations are humbug. My connections abroad are much stronger and more numerous than were those of King Ferdinand. Ferdinand knew only crowned heads of no importance, while I am on intimate terms with the ruling politicians of the

whole world. There is no danger. Nobody will touch Bulgaria. I have not promised. And then we have come to an understanding with Kristo Rakovski, Commissary in the Ukraine. The Soviets will not abandon us."

M. Stamboullsky has voiced a warning as to the future. "Even should nothing else happen," he declares, "there will be a general mix-up before long. Russia is persistently preparing a debacle which is inevitable. We shall plunge into this upheaval too, and something is sure to come out of it. Wait and see."

#### COMES TO DEFENSE OF DIVORCED WIFE.

She Is Charged With Conspiracy to Kill Second Husband for Insurance.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Sept. 20.—Although he divorced his wife that she might marry another, wealthier man,

James K. Price of Corbin, Ky., has come here to defend the woman, who is held on a charge of conspiring to murder her second husband.

The wife is Mrs. Laura Price Bowman, a local business man, was named as co-respondent in Price's divorce suit. Today Mrs. Bowman was taken to the State Hospital, for the insane for observation.

Robert Hinchman, a detective, and Charles Ripley, a railroad shopman, have told the prosecuting attorney, Mr. Bowman hired them for \$2,000 to kill the second husband. Bowman says he is "letting the law take its course," but Price feels differently.

"She may be insane," he said today, "I wouldn't be surprised, but she is the mother of my two small children and I haven't forgotten the old love. I won't desert her."

### XENIA, RUSS DANCER, GETS A KITTY CAT BY

Her Manager Made Customs Officers a Novel Sporting Proposition

BATUM, Black Sea, Sept. 21.—Travelers in and out of this port, the center of trade between Russia, Persia and points in India, are learning how to circumvent some of the restrictions of the Soviet authorities.

There is the case of the pet cat of Xenia, Xenia Maklitzona, an exponent of Russian dancing who is unknown in Boston and other American cities, had to return to Batum on personal business. This cat, she came South, and was lately in Batum anxious to go to Trebizond down the coast in Turkish territory to fulfill a dancing engagement. The port authorities suspected she was trying to bid them farewell, and at the same time carry away a few of the jewels for which Russia has become famous. So they began their game. They detained Xenia; searched her, and took away her money. Still she would go.

"All right," they said finally, "if you insist; but you can't take that Angora cat. We have a little idea you have fed her jewels, and that once aboard the steamer—"

Tears Xenia shed them copiously, but the shower was in vain. Then an official said he believed he would cut the cat open anyway, then and there.


Whereupon there came to the front Mr. Maklitzona, Xenia's manager, theatrical, diplomatic, and otherwise, and her husband. "Let a man handle this situation," he declared. "Cut the cat open," he said, "but on these terms: if jewels are found in her insides you, Mr. Customs Inspector can shoot me. If there are no jewels, I will shoot you. There is the pistol; there are my sporting terms. Go ahead and cut."

But no official could withstand this evidence of good faith. He let them go to Trebizond, all three, the dancer, the diplomat and the cat. He now tells the story on himself, and still insists the cat carried the jewels.

#### SUFFERING FROM KNIFE WOUND.

KINSTON, N. C., Sept. 22.—Harry Davis, a veteran of the 119th Infantry in the World War, is suffering from knife wounds the police today alleged to have

been inflicted by Alagan Gualtany. The man engaged in an affray in the east-end part of the city Tuesday night. One, the police said, accused the other of circulating anti-Semitic leaflets against him. He was desirous of having "the thing out with him." Davis, it was reported, struck Gualtany with a brass picket and attempted to inflict other blows. Gualtany drew his knife and cut the other on the chest. Davis was given an ambulance ride to the hospital. His wounds were serious. He was dangerously ill, it was reported. He died.
