KINSTON POLICE BELIEVE THEY HAVE JOHN GREENFIELD

KINSTON, Nov. 5.—The police here today suspected a plot to mislead them into releasing James Greenfield, a Wayne county negro held for suspected complicity in the murder of Albert Fugate, white planter and merchant, near Mount Olive recently. It was stated that the authorities at Goldsboro had been telephoned from "some source here" that the prisoner was not of a type to fit the description of the Jim Greenfield wanted by them. Officials here had been informed by acquaintances that Greenfield had "joined the church as John." Also he had attended an "advanced school for negroes here two terms under the same name, it was said. The police said they had secured an admission from Greenfield that he was from the Mount Olive section and was a cousin to negroes named in the Farmer case. He was arrested at a tobacco factory here. The local authorities held him for the Wayne officials.

"WHAT VOICE WILL YOU HEAR?" ASKS WALL

There are two things about ploughing: one is that it is hard work; another is that it is lonely work. Dr. Zed Wall in his sermon Sunday night. Dr. Wall said there were countless voices calling people. NOT EVERY DOG IS WHAT HE SEEMS TO BE

KINSTON, Nov. 5.—Not every dog with coarse hair and a woebegone expression is a common cur. The fact that a canine not possible of certain description was valued at \$200 in recent court litigation here, being regarded as a champion "coon dog," today caused local experts to declare there are many plain, every-day "yellow dogs" in the section worth \$50, or \$100, or \$150. A case of an owner refusing \$150 for an animal decidedly "off in the matter of looks" was related. The beast was shrewd at treeing coons. It was pointed out that many a nondescript bow-wow with a keen nose and a proper training has earned hundreds of dollars for sport-hunting owners. Raccoon hides have sold at record prices in recent years.

ASHEVILLE MAY KILL WIFE AND THEN SLAY SELF

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Nov. 6.—After firing four shots point blank into the body of his wife, Mrs. Effie Pressley, William H. Pressley, aged about 50, 31 Woodrow avenue, placed a revolver in his own head and killed himself this morning. Mrs. Pressley is at a local hospital, believed to be fatally wounded. In a statement to the police, she said her husband shot her because she had contributed 25 cents to a church collection on Sunday night. The statement also sets out that Pressley had sustained an injury to his head about two years ago and since then had been subject to irrational spells. The shooting occurred about 10 o'clock and was witnessed by a small daughter of Pressley by a former marriage.
