The good people of Goldsboro within the past year contributed money to send a twelve year old cripple girl to the Orthopaedic Hospital for treatment. The child has had wonderful relief from the operation and treatment at the hospital. She has been home with her parents for several months and now needs to return for further treatment, a change of braces and attention to her shoes. There is no money available for her transportation and for a change of her special shoes. MAY REVIVE GREAT RUSSIAN CANAL SYSTEM

Helsingfors, Dec. 29.—The Soviet Government has completed negotiations with the German Government for a loan from Scandinavian banking firms to be used for the extension of what is known as the Marie canal system. Canals connect the upper reaches of the Volga with the Neva, thus making Petrograd virtually a commercial port for the Caspian sea trade. A German steamer recently demonstrated that ships can pass from Petrograd to the Caspian sea through these canals, and the plan is to make them navigable for big river lighters and boats of a fair size.

The amount of the loan has not been made public. The steamer that made the passage of the canals and rivers, the "Princess Olga," the Finnish port of the Caspian sea, is a steam, fuel, and electric power plant. The trip was part of the German plan to regain former shipping influence, and hope of less in the future of an experiment. The steamer left Hamburg in July, passed through the Baltic to Petrograd, and by the Neva entered Lake Ladoga. Thence she made a long journey through the canals which brought her to Rbinsk, on the Volga. From that point the Volga is navigable for small vessels. The boat reached N. N. Novgorod on October 5, descended the river to Astrakhan, and proceeded to Basal.

The trip seems to have proved that the route is satisfactory, as Hamburg company has been organized and will build a fleet of vessels to make regular trips along this route. The boats will begin operations in the spring of 1923, and will carry German manufactured goods into Russian and the Caspian ports.

YANKEE KILNING—SHIP SINKING

WARREN, N. C., Dec. 29.—Wireless messages picked up at the Hampton Roads naval base this morning reported that the steamship Manneator was sinking off Cape May, N. J. The message stated that the vessel was listing badly to starboard and was running before a heavy gale.

CHICAGO, Dec. 29.—Rube Benton, former Giant pitcher, today was withdrawn from the National League roster. Commissioner Landis, in view of the publicity caused by the announcement of Benton's signing with the Cincinnati club and the connection of his name with the 1919 world's series scandal, Landis said last night, "Benton came to me to get a line on his status in organized baseball."

"So far as the records in my office show," Commissioner Landis concluded, "there is no reason to keep Benton out of the majors."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, wealthy Philadelphia draft evader is reported to be on his way from Germany to the United States. Bergdoll was a sailor during the war and was arrested by the department of Justice, released today by the war department. The report was said to be proceeding to President Hoover and it was announced, department of justice agents have been instructed to be on the lookout.

STOP PIPE ORGAN

KINSTON, Dec. 26.—Electricians now are certain that they discovered all of the trouble with the organ at the Gordon Street Christian church when they tinkered about the base of wires and stops and pulls in the big instrument. The organ for some days had been on the blink. There was fear that in the midst of the Christmas musical program the organ might go wrong at a critical moment and bring gloom to the organist and choir. The electricians found a chocolate drop resting on a wire or something connected with the bass chords after it had refused to perform during practice. When the candy had been removed and triumphantly exhibited by the electricians, the big organ boomed forth perfect notes and chimes. During the Christmas morning service it performed perfectly. At practice later the service it went on strike again, however, and the electricians were partly repudiated.

A NEW YORK PRODUCER MAY GIVE POLK PLAY

CHAPEL HILL, Dec. 29.—One of the most successful of New York's play producers, Brock Pemberton, is thinking of putting on a series of Carolina folk plays in New York. Frederick H. Koch, director of the Carolina Play makers, is just back from the big town, and while he was there Mr. Pemberton who had been reading the book about Carolina folk plays which Henry Holt and Company, brought out recently, said to him:

"I don't see why a special series of these plays wouldn't go big here. Theatre goers are getting interested in that sort of work. I'm going to think it over and write you later about it."

Mr. Pemberton broke into the limelight three or four years ago when he "discovered" Gilda Varese. He presented her in "Enter Madame" and it turned out to be one of the spectacular successes of the season. The play he is now offering is "Six Characters in Search of an Author." He has taken a lease on the Princess Theatre and it is there he is thinking of presenting the Carolina folk play.

ENGLAND WOULD HONOR PILGRIMS

LONDON, Dec. 29.—Plans have been formulated by general British historical societies to erect an imposing monument at Killingholme, on the Lincolnshire coast, to commemorate the Pilgrim Fathers' departure for America. The societies are at present seeking the assistance of British American societies in the movement.
