The Glee Clubs of the Goldsboro High School will give at the high school auditorium tonight at eight o'clock the beautifully descriptive cantata by Thomas Anderson called "The Wreck of The Hesperus" taken from the famous poem by Henry W. Longfellow. Browne Pierce, baritone, will take the part of the skipper of the gold ship Hesperus which is called Norman's Woe. Miss Annie Hines, soprano, is the skipper's daughter, and Leroy Spears, tenor, takes the part of "An Old Sailor." Incidental soprano solos are to be sung by Miss Maybelle Michel and Miss Louise Johnson. There will be no admission fee. The adult public is most cordially invited.

Salvation Army To Raise Funds

On July the 5th, 1865 William Booth held the first meeting of the Salvation Army. This meeting was held in the East End of London and the people attending it, was among the poorest in all the world. In the early sium meetings of the army some of the worst women and men was converted and went out to help in the conversion of others until the work had been extended to all parts of England, then some of the converts was from other lands and as they would return to their homes they would start work on the same plan as the founder which meant the establishment of a work in these countries outside of England.

The organization now has its work permanently established in 81 countries and colonies and use 52 languages in its work. There are 14,933 stations in the world where relief is given the needy. 28,261 men and women have given their entire time to the helping of the unfortunate, giving spiritual and material help when ever needed.

The work was started in the United States in 1879 by a family who had been connected with the movement in England and had emigrated to the city of Philadelphia. The first meetings was held in an old stable. Later in the year officers were sent to New York City and from then on the work has grown. In the year 1924 President Cleveland received a delegation of officers and gave them his official endorsement. Thus Mr. Cleveland was the first president to endorse the movement in the states as a national force. Similar endorsements have been received from all of the presidents since.

Goldsboro has had a Salvation Army Corps for a little more than a year and they have done much good for the short time that they have been here. Mayor Edgar Bain has been a warm friend of the cause for many years and at the time of the opening of the work he was made chairman of the advisory board and has served in that capacity up to the

present. A campaign committee is now being organized by Mayor Bain to secure funds to carry on the work in Goldsboro for a year this committee will be perfected by the 15th of April and a canvass of the city will be made. \$2,500.00 is the amount needed for this most worthy cause, and if each citizen will do his or her part the money will be very easily raised. The only income the officers here have had is what they have been able to collect themselves from

day to day with the tambourine. The plan is to secure the amount needed for the work in a drive and discontinue the daily collecting. This takes a lot of time that these people should spend in welfare work in the community.
