**Women in Favor of World Court**  
WASHINGTON, July 13.—The National League of Women Voters today definitely placed itself on record against all "eleventh hour" resolutions to the World Court resolution now pending in the United States Senate. It also served notice, in a statement issued by its executive committee from headquarters here that the League and the women voters comprising its membership, "will be impatient with lukewarm leadership and long drawn-out and pointless debate."

The League is urging adoption of the original World Court resolution as presented by the late President Harding and supported by President Coolidge and former Secretary of States Hughes, aligns itself with opponents to the proposed amendments submitted by Senators Popper and Borah.

**Hindenburg Likes Social Activities**  
BERLIN, July 13.—One of the greatest surprises in connection with the election of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg to the presidency of Germany is the aged soldier's apparent liking for social activities. The end of his social season has been marked by an almost uninterrupted succession of garden parties, fetes, smokers and receptions at the executive mansion, and the impressive figure of Von Hindenburg has been the center of them all.

Contrary to expectations President Von Hindenburg also accepts social invitations elsewhere, usually remaining until midnight. While under President Ebert severe simplicity marked all the presidential social affairs, Wilhelmstrasse now reverberates with military band music emanating from the executive gardens.

The president has amazed those around him by the pointed questions he puts to his guests regarding their branch of work. He appears to be fond of asking foreign guests how much German they know. His invitations include members of all political parties except the communists, and he does not attempt to force political conversations. At a recent smoker he gathered to his personal table such political leaders as George Bernhard, Theodore Wolff, and Rudolph Hilffinger, as well as a number of conservative editors.

Intimate friends of President Von Hindenburg say the best thing that ever happened to him was to force him from his seclusion at Hanover into the midst of a social maelstrom and that he appears to be growing younger every day. His political advisers declare themselves surprised at his modesty and unassuming attitude toward questions which are new to him. His favorite remark is said to be:

"Well, I hope I'll learn all this in time."

**French Premier a Very Hard Worker**  
PARIS, July 13.—A quarter of an hour's sleep in an arm chair is said to be sufficient to restore strength and energy to M. Painleve, France's premier and war minister, no matter how great or prolonged the exertion.

When the chamber recently discussed the fiscal messages of Minister of Finance Caillaux, M. Painleve was in his place on the ministerial bench throughout the night, calm and attentive all the while. Although it was 6 o'clock in the morning before the vote was taken, the premier was in the senate at 10 ready to steer the bill through the upper house. This was successfully done by 6 o'clock in the evening, and at 8 M. Painleve reached the war ministry, where he found his entire staff waiting him with the expectation of being dismissed for the day. ## Palace of King Tut Unearthed

**Tut Unearthed**  
NEW YORK, July 11.—The palace in which King Tutankhamun, Egyptian monarch, who lived 3,500 years ago, passed twenty years of his life, recently was unearthed in middle Egypt by the Egyptian Exploration society, Thoms Whittemore, American representative, said upon his arrival on the Mauretania.

The palace was in an unusual state of preservation and will add much to the knowledge of the king, whose tomb was excavated at Luxor, he said. The palace is at Akhataton, about 700 miles from Luxor and is built of sun-baked brick, which had been preserved by the shifting sand. The name of King Tutankhamun appears many times on its walls.
