DANGERS OF WHOOPING COUGH

In our happy-go-lucky way attributed to us by the thriffter nations of the world, we have acquired a carelessness that borders on criminal negligence. Realizing that this carelessness is largely due to ignorance of the public as to the importance of carrying out, or maintaining a strict observance of the quarantine. The local health department and the committee on public information of the Wayne County Medical Society is taking this means of calling attention to the danger of that most common disease of childhood, known by the various terms pertussis, whooping cough, six weeks cough, and spasmodic cough.

Whooping cough is a disease that the general public looks on as of no importance. Most mothers hold the view that at some time their child will have whooping cough, and that there is little or no use in running from the disease. As a matter of fact whooping cough is one of the most deadly of all the diseases that occur to children under six months of age, and the severity is less and less as the child grows older. Lit-

ice or no trouble is experienced in quarantine for diphtheria as everyone seems to appreciate its importance, but mothers will allow their children to cough for weeks, become cyanotic and generally debilitated before consulting a physician, feeling that it is nothing but the whooping cough and the child will get well anyhow. Shutting their eyes to the fact that during these paroxysms of coughing a child may suck in a plug of mucous and bring on pneumonia, the blood pressure may be violently constricted from the lungs and the little one develops cerebral hemorrhage which may result in partial or complete paralysis or even death. If mothers who have children that they even suspect of having whooping cough should consult their physician and keep the child at home away from other children a great step forward would be made in cutting the prevalence of this disease. Don't fool yourself that you are the only one who hears or sees your child cough. The health department is backed up with telephone calls from angry, irate mothers who are hearing their children cough and seeing them attended by colored maids clustered about the parks, passing the disease on and on to others. The undervaluing establishments are of course necessary, but why increase their business by burying yours or your neighbor's baby through your carelessness in this important matter? If you will only follow the golden rule and do as you would be done by, keeping your child at home and away from other children when it has any disease whatsoever, this would be a happier and healthier community. —Wayne County Health Department.
