 spending \$20,000 fixing up the mansion, laying in a splendid supply of stationery, lead pencils, even the small toilet articles required in the departments in Raleigh, etc., they ascertained the state owed on June 30 \$9,453,531.01. I submit also that there was totaled absence of any financial statement about of upon either a Cash or Accrued basis, but simply a ledger, and then quickly applied to the foundation stones of the glorious business administration which we are about to have all property on hand, all supplies, all planted crops on the right or ten great farms of the state fertilized and laid by, all taxes in arrears, and all accrued taxes for six months. This cannot be justified by any system of accounting known to men. Cash, revenue or accrued, or any other, except one invented by a lot of politicians in North Carolina for purely political purposes.

Not Hostile

FRENCH DEBT PROFFER IS REJECTED

Secretary Mellon Puts Aside First Proposal For Funding Of War Debt
SERIOUS DIFFERENCES
 Neither Delegation Attempts To Minimize Differences Which Have Arisen

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—(AP)—The French and American Commission considering the funding of France's war debt to the United States will meet again Monday, and it was indicated tonight that finance minister Caillaux will have a new offer ready for submission at that time. The French delegation spent most of today and will be busy tomorrow in calculations designed to produce a formula for a settlement that will more nearly conform to the American view as expressed yesterday by secretary Mellon in putting aside the first proffer made by M. Caillaux.
 There are serious differences yet to be surmounted and spokesmen for both sides made no attempt to minimize them. Yet the feeling was apparent that progress had come from the discussions which were carried at dinner and luncheon tables at which undersecretary Winston and M. Caillaux have been hosts. The heads of two missions, secretary Mellon, Mr. Winston and several others, members of the French delegation had luncheon with the French minister today at the Embassy.
