Mr. D'Oise who has been permitting his associates to handle the more important roles, went into the lead last night and handled a difficult part in a manner to prove conclusively his claim to greatness on the speaking stage. KAISERSLAUTERN, Rhineland Palatinate, Germany, Dec. 24. (AP)—"Die Wacht am Rhein" is still verboten in the occupied areas where the real "watch" is maintained by Allied troops.
