CARRYING THINGS THROUGH WITH A HIGH HAND.

Legislation Governor Stripped of Power. Public Printing No Longer Open to the Lowest Bidder. Partisanship and Sectionalism Gave to Good—The Week's Proceedings.

At one minute past twelve last Wednesday the Fusion House of Representatives of the State of North Carolina was called to order by Clerk J. Milton Brown.

Rev. D. H. Tuttle pastor of the Central Methodist church opened the proceedings with prayer. The members came forward by twelves and were sworn in by Assistant Justice Walter Clark, 118 of the 130 members being present.

The election of principal clerk of the Senate was then declared in order. E. King, of Odom, was the Fusion candidate and W. G. Burkhead of Columbus the Democratic. King received 43 votes, Burkhead 5.

For Reading Clerk Spencer Blackburn, (Rep.) of Ashe, received 48 votes, Wiley Bass (Dem.) of Randolph 4, and for Engraving Clerk A. D. K. Wallace, of Rutherford, was elected by the same 43 votes.

Mr. Peebles objected to reading the memorial. Mr. McKenna now read up his resolution which was read, and referred, as follows:

"Resolved, That it be the duty of the Committee on Privileges and Elections to examine every election contest referred to them and to ascertain and report as soon as practicable whether or not the same is properly and legally constituted before the bar of the House of Representatives before proceeding to investigate the matter upon its merits."

Mr. French (Rep.) of New Hanover introduced a bill with the request that it be referred to a special committee of fifteen and be read according to its title "to repeal existing election laws and to secure to the people a free ballot and a fair count."

Mr. Bean (R.) of Randolph, bill "to repeal section 14, article 7, of the Constitution of North Carolina." Here is the section: "The General Assembly shall have full power by statute to modify, change or abrogate any and all of the provisions of this article, and substitute others in their place, except sections 7, 9 and 13."

Mr. Ewart (R.) of Henderson, bill "to establish county government;" a bill in relation to giving bonds in guarantee companies. Adjournment.
