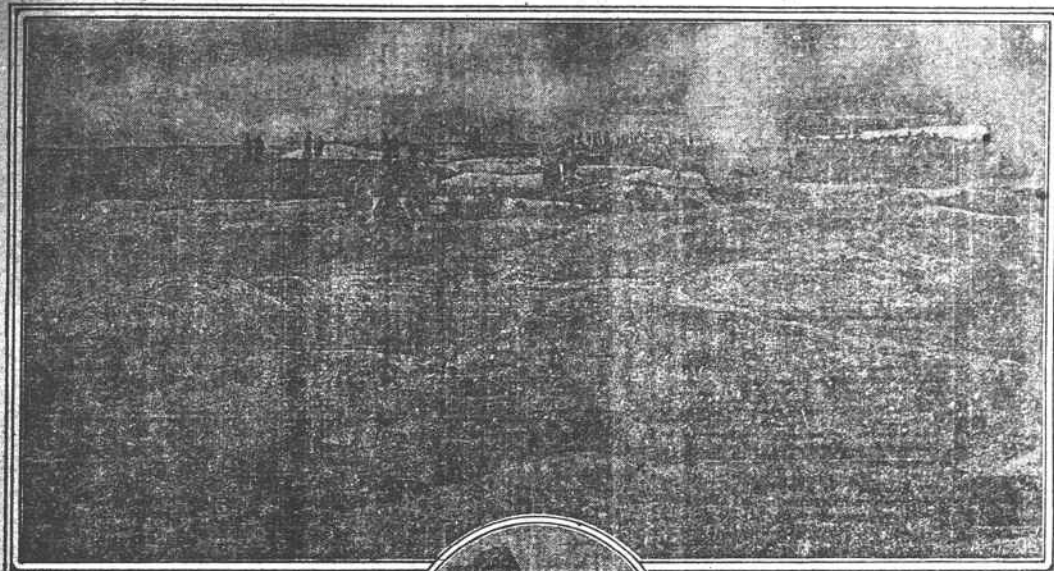

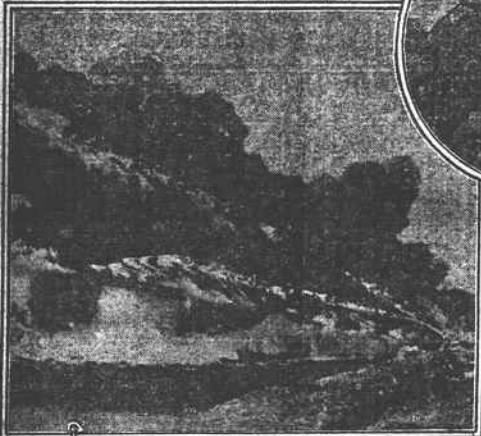


Troops of the Allies, fighting in this network of trenches,

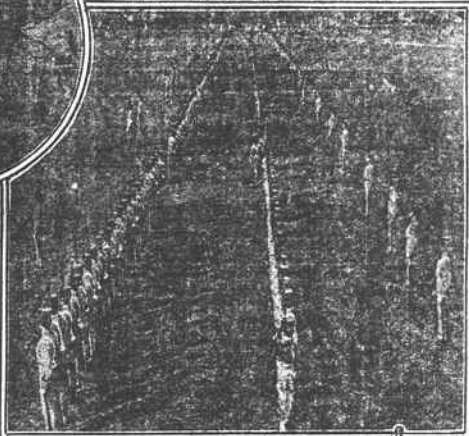
helped Hindenburg to make his "Masterly Retreat"

MOVABLE TRENCHES

Trenches that may be picked up bodily and moved around from place to place are the invention of United

States marines, who use this novel apparatus for practice in hand-grenade throwing.

Sections, about ten feet long, with a parapet that stands three feet

above the head of the grenadier, form a skeleton framework of pine, shaped similar to the regular trenches. From inside these portable trenches, or "stalls," as the

marines call them, the men hurl the grenades over ten feet away, to repress trenches
