

Per Capita Subscription Is \$74.12—161st Infantry Stands Far in Lead of Regimental Units With Total of \$202,950—Ninety Per Cent of 147th Machine Gun Battalion Bought a Bond.

The organization having the largest subscription was the 161st Infantry regiment, 1,540 of the 2,390 men in that regiment subscribing for a total of \$202,950 in Liberty loan bonds. The 147th machine gun battalion, with a percentage of 90, led all other organizations of a strength of 250 or more in the per cent of total strength subscribing. The largest individual subscription was \$10,000 but the subscriber's name was not divulged.

Removal From Gettysburg to Camp Completed—Six Other Regiments Follow From Penn.

The removal to Camp Greene of the Fourth United States Infantry regiment, commanded by Captain Wall, was completed early yesterday, the regiment being assigned quarters in reservation No. 10, near the base hospital. This regiment has a strength of about 50 officers and 1,200 enlisted men, and is the first of the six regiments of regulars ordered here from Gettysburg. The other five regiments ordered from Gettysburg to Camp Greene are the Seventh, Fifty-seventh, Fifty-eighth, Fifty-ninth, Sixtieth and Sixty-first, having a combined strength of approximately 12,000 officers and

The Fourth is sadly lacking officers of the grades higher than captain. The battalions are commanded by captains, as there is at present not a major attached to the regiment. Neither has the regiment a colonel or lieutenant colonel.

Officers of the regiment do not know why they were sent here, "unless it was to get us into a camp where the winter weather will not be so severe as at Gettysburg." If the regiment is to be recruited to the maximum war strength of about 2,500 officers and men, none of the officers have any knowledge of such intention on the part of the war department, though they regard this as likely. This applies with great accuracy to the other regiments ordered here, some of which have arrived.

Lieutenant William A. Campbell and Lieutenant William C. Stark, formerly attached to the 145th Artillery regiment, were assigned and have assumed their duties at aides on the brigade staff of the Eighty-second Infantry brigade, commanded by Brigadier General Wedgwood.

The Scottish Musical Comedy company has been engaged to sing for the soldiers at all the army cantonments. From here they go to Camp Wadsworth, at Spartanburg.

"The Man God Threw Away," was the subject of the sermon delivered by Rev. P. H. McDowell, D. D., of Melrose, Mass., yesterday afternoon to the regular army and national guard soldiers at Camp Greene.

Dr. McDowell recently arrived at the camp to assume his duties as camp pastor at Camp Greene for the Baptist denomination, having been released by his church, the First Baptist church, of Melrose, Mass. He was the choice of the Northern and Southern Baptist conventions for this work.
