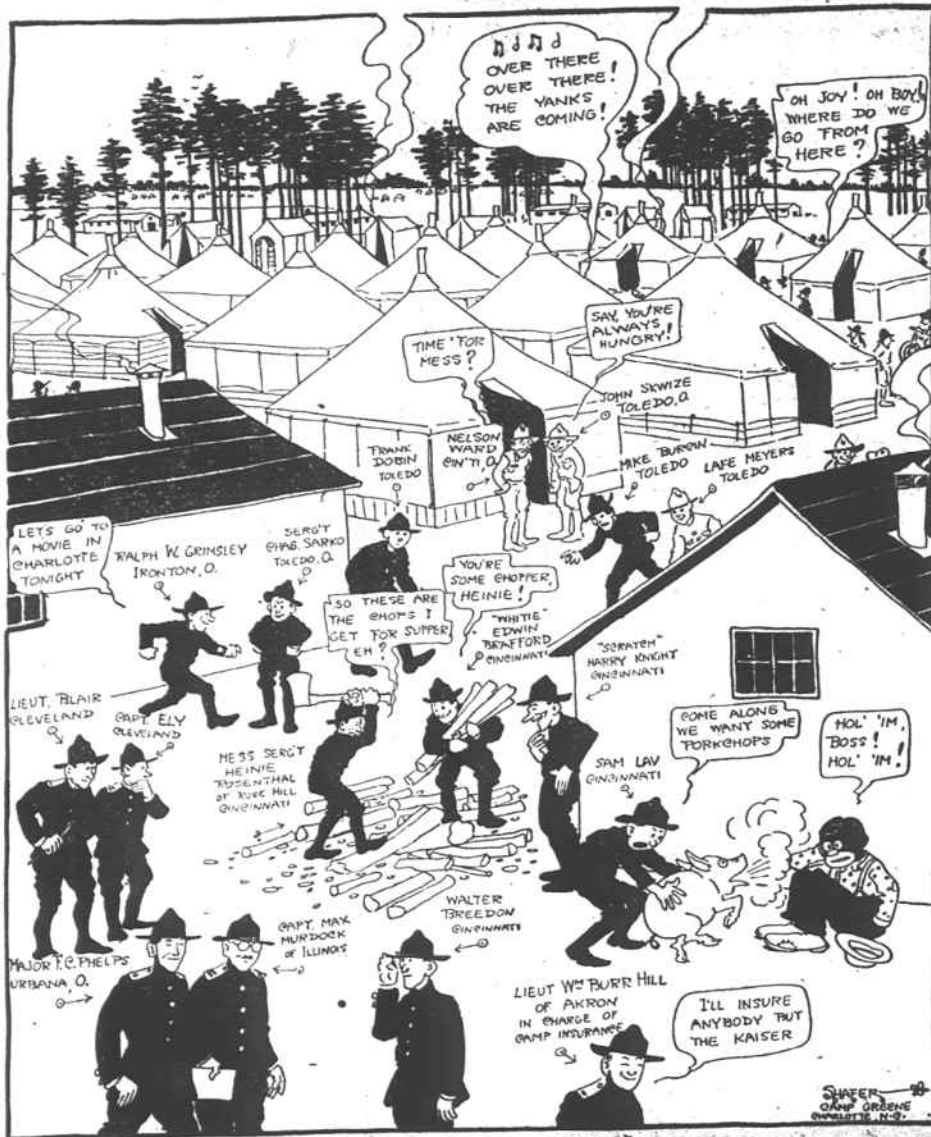


SOME OF THE OHIO BOYS AT CAMP GREENE.

DOWD ROAD TO CAMP IS NOW BEING PAVED

Forces at work on the Dowd road towards Camp Greene began laying the pavement the past week, and it was stated by W. R. Matthews, chairman of the board of Charlotte township trustees, that work will progress as rapidly as possible and will be completed within a comparatively short time.

When the road is completed it will mean that Camp Greene will be easily accessible from all parts of the city of Charlotte and into all parts of the camp. The Tuckasee road is at present carrying the greater part of the traffic between city and camp, this road having been paved with an 18-foot roadway some time since.

When the Dowd road is completed there will be a paved street down each side of the camp, to the back side, and leading into the principal streets of the city. Leaving Independence square one may go down West Trade and thence into the eastern side of the camp, both ways being paved like a city street. It will be a tremendous improvement over the roads of last winter, when there were only the worn out macadam roads leading into the camp.

HOSTESS HOUSE GIVES CONCERT ON SUNDAY

The Camp Greene hostess house is now ready for the soldier and civilian visitor, having recently been completely overhauled and beautified, both inside and out. A short program was given on Sunday afternoon, inaugurating what is hoped will prove a very popular service for the soldiers located at this camp. For the benefit of the new men recently arrived here it might be well to state that the hostess house is located on the Tuckasee road, near the present aviation headquarters. It is situated in a beautiful oak grove that will furnish shade and comfort on the warm summer afternoons and evenings. It is hoped that a large use will be made of it.

CHANGE IN TRAINING PLANS AT CAMP REPORTED

Order Sending Motor Mechanics to Factories Amended and Regiments Are Brigaded, Kirtland Commanding.

While official announcement is lacking, there are abundant indications at Camp Greene that the order, issued several weeks ago providing for the splitting up temporarily of the Motor Mechanics regiment into small squads and sending these squads to factories where aeroplane parts are manufactured, has been amended. So far as could be learned, relatively few men of these regiments have been sent away for special practical training courses.

Lieutenant Colonel Roy C. Kirtland, who was commander of the Third Motor Mechanics regiment when it arrived here, is now in general command of both the Third and Fourth Motor Mechanics regiments, it is understood. It was stated these regiments for purposes of administration have been formed into a brigade, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Kirtland, as the ranking officer of the two regiments. Major Phelps is commanding the Third Motor Mechanics and Major Coker is commanding the Fourth Motor mechanics, it was reported.

General Kennon is commander of the camp. The impression seemingly prevailing at the camp is that General Kennon has been designated as permanent commander of this army post, which will eliminate a degree of disorganization which arises as a consequence of changes in the units stationed there. Under the regular policy of military administration, the ranking officer at this camp was the commander.

TWO PROMINENT CLERGYMEN ON VISIT TO CAMP GREENE

Camp Greene will be visited this week by two prominent clergymen, both of whom will make a number of addresses to the soldiers located here. Dr. Wm. H. Milton, rector of one of the largest Episcopal churches in the South, will be in camp practically all of this week. He is to speak at "Y" building 106 Tuesday evening at 8:15 o'clock, at 102 Thursday night, and Friday night he will be at the base hospital. Dr. Milton is a speaker of much force. He has visited a large number of military camps and canton-

ments in the southeastern department. A clergyman representing the war council of the Reformed church also will be at camp. He will speak at "Y" 104 Wednesday evening at 8:15 o'clock and at 105 Thursday evening. In spite of the fact that the evenings are rather warm now there should be good congregations out to hear the addresses that will be made by these two gentlemen. They will be well worth the while.
