Fuel oil books for cooking and ighting that expired on February 10 re being renewed and mailed as fast as the office force can handle them.

Beginning Tuesday of this week, the following kind of shoes are being ratiozed. All shoes made in whole or in part of leather or with rubber soles, including all ordinary types and hard soled moccasins, casual, play, platform and rubber soled athletic shoes.

The shoes that are not rationed are as follows: all rubber shoes, except hose that have already been rationed (six types) soft and hard soled house and boudoir slippers, soft soled infants' shoes and ballet slippers. Shoe epairs are not rationed.
