Every Man, Woman and Child Must Register For Ration Book Number Two

"Every person should register for War Ration Book Two, whether he needs it at present or not," Ryan McBryde, chairman of the Hoke County War Price and Rationing Board, cautioned residents of Hoke County today.

"Reports to the ration board indicate that farmers who raise and can their own fruits and vegetables and meats are under the impression that they will not need to register for the point ration book. On the contrary, Uncle Sam WANTS every man, woman, and child in the United States to have a ration book, since the rationing program may include not only its present phases, but other possible developments in the future.

"I want to emphasize the necessity for every person—whether he lives in town or country, whether he preserves his own food or relies on the corner grocery, to register for War Ration Book Two during the 3-day period from February 25 through February 27," Mr. McBryde said.
