HOKE NARRATIVE REPORT FOR MARCH

Eleven Home Demonstration Clubs met in Hoke County in March. The meetings were attended by 141 club members. The major project for the month was "Quick and Sure Methods of Making a Dress."

The Home Agent spent March 4 in Lumberton where she attended Agent's school.

At a meeting of the Hoke County Farm Bureau on the evening of March 5th, the Home Agent, in behalf of the Bank of Raeford, presented Mrs. J. H. Plummer, a Rockfish Home Demonstration Club member, a \$25 War Bond for having the best Victory Garden in Hoke County in 1942.

On March 25 and 26 a Food Preservation Workshop was held in the Home Economics Department of Hoke High School. The first day the demonstration was given to six Home Economists in the county. The second day the meeting was attended by 55 leaders and Home Economists. Plans were made to take information in food preservation to every home in Hoke County.

The Rockfish and Raeford Clubs decorated two Day Rooms at Camp McCall near Hoffman. Curtains were furnished and made for 28 windows in each building, which is 300 feet long and 20 feet wide. A group of women from each club went to Camp McCall to do the decorating. Hanging book cases, whatnots, pillows, pictures, vases, waste baskets, books and magazines and a card table were placed in each building. Monk's cloth was used for curtains in one building and red print was used in the other. Plans have been made to decorate other buildings later on.

The Hoke County Library Board and the County Nutrition Committee met in the Home Agent's office during the month.

The Ashmont club held an all day quilting on March 10. The quilt they completed was turned over to the local Red Cross Chapter.

Many Home Demonstration club members assisted with the Red Cross War Drive during March.

The Little River Club voted to purchase a pressure cooker as soon as they are available. The cooker will be kept at Mrs. J. W. Smith's home and will be loaned to women in the community.

Sixty five library books were checked to women at Club meetings during March.

Wartime Rationing Guide

SUGAR—Stamp No. 12, in War Ration Book 1 is good for five pounds of sugar through May 31.

COFFEE—Stamp No. 26 good for one pound through April 25.

FUEL OIL—Number 4 coupon became valid January 30 and will be good for 9 gallons until April 6. Period 3 coupons good for 9 gallons and valid through February 19.

GASOLINE—Coupon No. 4 in A book good for three gallons Temporary "T" coupons will be issued directly by ration boards for a period of not more than 30 days. Boards will use original ODT certificates only for checking the inspection.

TIRES—Holders of Ration A coupons must have tires inspected by OPA on or before March 31. Holders of B and C must get first inspection by February 28.

SHOES—Coupon 17, in the sugar and coffee ration book entitles each holder to one pair of shoes until June 15, when a new stamp will be designated.

WAR RATION BOOKS — Ration Book 1 is being currently used for purchase of sugar and coffee. War Ration Book 2 for rationing canned goods started into use March 1st.

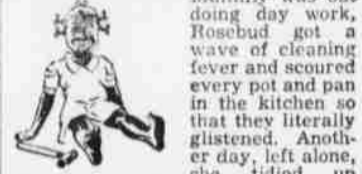


WOMEN AT WAR
