To see a home, Miss Ellen McNeill welcomed eight of her kinswomen at a beautifully appointed luncheon on Wednesday, May 6, when she opened the hospitable doors of her country home, Knapdale Plantation, in Scotland county, re-christened after a period of fifty years.

The large house, with its simple though dignified architecture, in truth a double house—the older part of the house being nearly 150 years of age, and the newer part built about 100 years ago, with surrounding plantation and cemetery, marks the first known residence of Emigrants Hector McNeill and his young son Angus McNeill, and a daughter Sarah, who with other members of his family, came from Knapdale, Argyshire, Scotland, to North Carolina near about the year 1700, and settled in Richmond county. A second son Lauchlin was born to Hector McNeill and his wife before they came to North Carolina. Through marriages with the descendants of Emigrant brothers John and Peter McEneaney, and Aster Ann, true and tried friends and neighbors of Hector McNeill, senior (Lumber river divided the plantations of these two men) the two sturdy Scotch strains, in all their ramifications, are today a common bond between fully half the gentleness of Scotland, Hoke and Robeson counties, a kinship also reaching broadly throughout Cumberland county.

In the plantation cemetery, which lies near the old house, may be found the neatly marked tomb of Hector McNeill, senior. He was the father of Angus and Lauchlin. Their wives and families, of Major Jack McNeill and his wives, later acceptants of the home.

Motoring over from Lenoirburg, guests found the simple old house sheltered by a number of ancient oaks. Greeted graciously by the hostess at the wide-flung door, all eyes were instantly arrested by a quaint and spacious room—"the hall" of olden day directly faced the door. It was cold for the month of May; a cheerful fire blazed upon the cavernous hearth, and in its reflections the dining table, laid with exquisite linen, gleaming silver, and graced with beautiful centerpiece of garden flowers, left gracious and indelible memories of this visit with each guest.
