Wash Woolen Clothes Carefully

This is the way to wash and dry wool: To wash or not to wash? For most wool clothing, dry cleaning is better than washing. However, many knit garments, bannel and challies may be washed satisfactorily at home. And many a homemaker learns to wash a blanket so it won't turn out shrunken or boardy. The warmth of a blanket depends very largely upon the amount of nap, so it's well worthwhile to take care in the washing to hold the fluffy softness.

For a comforter, dry-cleaning is best. Washing is likely to leave the filling lumpy and matted. Use lukewarm soft water, and mild soap. Hard water can be softened with an ammonia or borax solution. Use cautiously or you may add too much alkali for the good of the wool. And, be sure the water is lukewarm, for you may shrink wool in one hot or cold dip. Allow plenty of water, more than for most fabrics. Dissolve mild soap in the water. Or use one of the soapless oil washing materials such as are sold for hair hampers. Make generous suds before the wool goes in.

Never soak wool. Wash by hand, if you can. Squeeze suds through fabric. Rubbing shrinks and hardens wool. If you use a washing machine, don't crowd wool articles and wash them quickly. Never boil them.

When wool is clean, rinse 2 or 3 times in clear lukewarm water. Squeeze water out gently. Don't wring or twist.

A warm, but not hot place, is just right for drying. Never let wool things freeze.

LITTLE ANKLETS LURE COTTON TO THE MILLS

Those little anklets, in their many colors, worn by the "lady friends" of America, assume a magnitude far beyond the average thought in the cotton processing done by American cotton textiles.

As little as they are, they loom large in the sum total of the cotton industry, as will be seen in the figures issued not long ago.

Light in weight per pair, as they are, the women and girls wear an annual average of 42,500 bales of cotton made up into the anklets which in recent years have become increasingly popular.
