## Ginning Contest To Be Held This Year

A cotton ginning contest, based on the normal preparation of bales and turnout of middling or better grades of lint, will be held for North Carolina ginneries this year. Dr. I. O. Schaub, N. C. State College extension service director, said this week.

Schaub said a winner will be picked for each of the three gin districts in the state upon the basis of bale samples submitted for classification.

### FIRST COTTON BLOOM

Mrs. Jesse Gibson at Dunderbach reported three white cotton blossoms found in her field Sunday, June 13th, which is the earliest date for cotton blossoms in either Hoke or Scotland counties for the past 25 years, except one year only a blossom was reported on June 12th.

## County Poultrymen Urged To New Goal In Egg Production

**Task For Hoke County Hens Is 14.2% Greater: Most Farms Have Larger Laying Flocks, But Labor and Feed Are Problems.**

Hoke County poultrymen are asked by the government to produce approximately 297,000 dozen eggs this year, 14.2 per cent more than in 1942, as their share in the Food for Victory program, the National Poultry Defense Committee estimated today.

This county goal, which is based on the percentage increase suggested for North Carolina by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, can be reached if adequate supplies of labor and feed are available, declared Committee Chairman Hobart Creighton.

**BARLEY**  
County Agent H. H. Harris reports that H. L. Sprull of Columbia has produced an exceptionally good crop of Sunrise barley. It is very early, an important consideration where legumes follow it.

**PEANUTS**  
Sixty-four growers in Chowan County cooperated in treating a total of 50,750 pounds of seed peanuts, reports County Agent C. W. Overman.

**MILK**  
F. L. Moore of Person County has a purebred bull and is milking 10 cows. He has increased his pasture to 20 acres and plans a trench silo, reports Assistant County Agent C. C. Jackson.

**SOYBEANS**  
In spite of the spring, Stanly County growers have put in an increased acreage of soybeans, says V. A. Huncy, assistant county agent.

## Lumberton Report Says Tobacco Prospects "Fair"

Lumberton, June 15.—Good rains throughout the Lumberton area have broken the hot weather wave and put the tobacco crop well on its way to improve growth, says a crop condition report just issued by Jasper C. Hutto, supervisor of the Lumberton tobacco market. The report says that if the rains do not become excessive the tobacco crop should experience excellent development in the next week or ten days, recovering some from the late start it got this year.

"Wire worms and bud worms are giving much trouble in some sections with grasshoppers reported from some territories," the report adds. "Severe hail damage has been limited to small areas. Some areas are actually needing more rain."

Field reports from nine counties to the Lumberton supervisor indicate the farmers are about equally divided as between "good" and "fair" in their estimates on the progress of the tobacco crop, with a small percentage reporting "poor."
