

Treasury Department Qualifies

The Bank of Raeford

Depositary For Withheld Taxes.

Notice to Employers.

Employers are required to deposit in a qualified depositary withheld taxes amounting to more than \$100.00 in any month before the 10th of the following month. Employers withholding taxes of \$100.00 or less in a month are NOT required to deposit such taxes in a depositary bank, but there is nothing in the regulations prohibiting them from doing so, and qualified depositaries will be expected to accept such deposits when tendered. It is also permissible for employers to make deposits oftener than once each month. It is our understanding that the Treasury Department expects every depositary to accept deposits of withheld taxes regardless of amount when tendered in funds immediately available to the depositary, but does not expect the depositary to advocate the making of deposits more frequently than once each month.
