As a sidelight piece of evidence to the need of unity and an end of Army and Navy waste of time and power, an Associated Press correspondent from Sicily in a delayed dispatch gays:

Perhaps more than any other sin-gle campaign, Sicily showed the absolute necessity for, and the dividends to be reaped from, the close coordination of sea and land power.

There were misunderstandings and differences during the Sicilian operations, but in the end they were solved satisfactorily.
