**Home Agent Says New Club Formed At Mt. Pleasant**

Twelve home demonstration clubs met in Hoke county in September with an attendance of 129. The major project was "Safety in the Home". A new club was organized in the Mt. Pleasant community in Little River Township.

The farm and home agents attended a conference in Raleigh from September 8 through the 11th. The conference was attended by agents from the 20 Southeastern counties.

Mrs. Marshall Newton, county council president, Mrs. Hector McNeill, Mrs. Wallace McLean and the home agent met with groups of club members from Robeson and Cumberland counties in Fayetteville on September 24. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the mobilization drive to increase membership in the home demonstration clubs in the state.

The home agent attended an Agents' Conference in Lumberton on September 28.

Six more pressure cookers were

distributed by women in Hoke county in September. This was six more than the quota first allotted to the county. Since the quota on cookers has been entirely lifted it is expected that more pressure cookers will be available in the county.

Mrs. Jessie Gibson, a member of the Midguson club, volunteered at the September club meeting to plant a turnip patch for the Midguson school lunch room.

Eleven clubs voted to furnish home made cakes for the Soldiers' Center in Raeford. Each club voted to take a month and furnish a cake each Saturday during that month. The Way-side club furnished cakes during September.

The home agent attended a Nutrition Committee meeting, a Machinery Rationing Board meeting and a meeting of the 3rd War Loan Committee during the month.

Several clubs voted to make contributions to the drive for articles for the hospital at Camp Mackall. This is handled through the Camp and Hospital Committee of the American Red Cross. The home agent is serving as chairman of this committee. Among the articles promised were card tables, bedroom slippers, pictures, radios, phonograph records, playing cards, rugs, books and maps.

Thirty one home demonstration club women served on the Third War Loan Committee in their local communities.

A number of people were assisted with meat canning during the month. Mrs. E. A. Wright, of the Blue Springs club, canned meat for the first time last winter and plans to can more this year. Mrs. Wright said, "I've never canned anything that has saved me any more time than the meat I canned last winter."

Fifty-nine library books were checked to club women at meetings in September. September report of Josephine Hall, Home Agent.

**Tobacco Market at Lumberton Sold 22,858,315 Pounds**

Lumberton, Oct. 6—Lumberton's tobacco market closed its 1943 auction season with its last sales Friday and showed a total of 22,858,315 pounds sold for the season, according to the final seasonal report of Jasper C.

Hutto, general director of the market.

Farmers received for their tobacco through the Lumberton auction houses \$8,871,022.93 for a season market average of \$38.81 a hundred pounds. The price average showed an increase of 32 cents a hundred over the \$38.49 average of 1942.

The Lumberton market opened the selling season August 5. Three full sets of tobacco company buyers followed ailes until the opening of the Middle Belt September 13. Two sets of buyers made purchases from that time till the close Friday. Seven auction houses handled the season's offerings.

Operators of the Lumberton market say the season just closed ranks second only to the record season of 1942 in the successful years of auction selling in Lumberton. Unfavorable tobacco growing weather this year cut the tonnage in the Lumberton area as it did throughout the flue-cured territory.
