Miss Shankle Gives Report On Sale Of Christmas Seals

\$191.83 Received To Date; Kiwanis Handling Sales To Business Houses.

Miss Aris Shankle county chairman of the annual sale of Christmas Seals for the tubercular association's educational fund reports that \$191.83 has been received by her so far in the 1943 campaign.

The sale to individuals which is being carried out this year by mail, the sale to Negroes through their own committee, and the sale to business firms of the county conducted by members of the Kiwanis Club, are expected to be brought to a close early this month.

Miss Shankle states that the sale of the business houses of the county

being conducted by the Kiwanis Club with Dr. Marcus Smith and Marion Gatlin in charge has progressed wonderfully and that there has been most excellent cooperation with many firms buying large blocks of seals or bonds of the larger denominations.

Reports from a few of the individuals have been received as yet, but it is hoped that those receiving seals through the mails will remit promptly. Those stamps and the addressing of the letters were handled by students of the commercial department of the Hoke High school.

Miss Shankle explained that this is the first year a mail sale has been used in the county and the mailing list was not complete. Those who have not received seals may secure them direct from her or during the street sales during December.

She has prohibited the carrying of eggs or poultry to other countries.
