Wartime Rationing Guide

- Meats, Fats, Stamps L, M and N expire January 1st. Canned Foods, Green A, B and C (Book 4) expire December 30. Sugar, No. 29 (Book 4) good for 5 pounds through January 15. Shoes, No. 18 (Book 1) valid indefinitely. Gasoline, A-8 coupons expire February 8. Fuel Oil, Period 1 coupons good through January 3. Validity Dates for Brown Stamps, OPA has announced dates when two more sets of brown stamps in Book 3 will be good for buying ration meats and fats.
