It was announced last week by the State Board of Elections that the local Election Board for Hoke County would be composed of three members. Two Democrats and one Republican were picked for boards in each of the 100 counties of North Carolina.

Named for Hoke County were G. B. Rowland and F. F. McPhaul, Democrats, and D. C. Cox, Republican, this being one county in which the local recommendations were accepted.

The Board of Elections in a county is responsible for conducting all except municipal elections, observance of election laws, appointment and training of officials and other duties.

A special venire of fifty citizens from Hoke County was carried to Lumberton last Thursday a jury of twelve for the trial of the three men charged with being members of the Robeson Klavern of Ku Klux Klan.
