Fifty-seven seniors, one of the largest graduating classes in recent years, will hear an address by Dr. Mark Depp, pastor of Centenary Methodist Church in Winston-Salem. Dr. Depp is one of the leading ministers of the Western Methodist Conference and is much in demand as a speaker on various programs. He delivered the principal address at the Superintendents Conference in High Point during the past winter. Dr. Depp will be introduced by Rev. P. O. Lee.
