Poultryman Must Always Be Alert

Poultrymen deal in futures and must be constantly planning ahead if their work is to be well coordinated and money is to be made from the enterprise, says R. S. Dearstyne, head of the department of poultry science, N. C. State College.

Dearstyne says, "Sometimes the poultryman waits until it is too late." Raising young stock is one of the "very important" practices of poultry management. What about the future of your poultry range? To have a good range continually throughout the years requires careful planning. Most ranges may quickly lose

their usefulness, says Dearstyne. A two-year rotation plan is desirable as a disease-prevention program if it is at all practical on the farm.

Ranges of Ladino clover, alfalfa or a grass mix that will stay green and succulent under local conditions should be the aim of every poultryman, says the poultry scientist. Your county agent should be able to assist you in planning such a range, or ranges. "A good grazing crop is a money-saver and birds on range should develop high vitality," says Dearstyne. "Let's plan ahead."
