Town Sewage Disposal Plant Nearing Completion



New Town Sewage Disposal Plant

A representative of the Public Health Service, in an inspection trip here last week. found Raeford's projected sewage disposal plant progressing nicely and payments being made promptly by the town, according to Town Manager Ed Williams.

Such check-ups are routine before the government will chip in the periodical portions of its proffered part.

Williams said the \$488,500 plant is 58 per cent finished and is expected to be ready for use next April. A bond issue passed by Raeford citizens will supply \$315,000 of the cost. The government will pay \$144. 000. The remainder will come from a fund set up by the town board.

The contractor is Boyle Construction Co. of Sumter. S.C. Construction work entails considerable excavation and the erection of a cement and steel building plus numerous cement ground-level tanks.
