## Widening Of 401 Gets **Backing Of Elsie Webb**

## Harris Ave. **Also Slated**

### For Work

Highway 401 apparently soon will be widened from Raeford to Fayetteville, making the entire 20-mile stretch a fourlane duel highway. J. Elsie Webb, district high-

way commissioner, said here this week that the 401 project is his "first project for Hoke County." He said he will recommend it be set up by the State Highway Department as soon as practicable.

A portion of the highway -from Fayetteville westward to Seventy-First School -- already is being widened to four lanes. That portion of the improvement is expected to be paved this summer.

Webb gave no indication as to when he will make his recommendation to the State Highway Commission. He did indicate, however, that he is giving the project high priority in his plans for this district.

The commission has set up no primary road improvements this year, he said.

Webb said it generally is about 18 months after a project has been "set-up" before actual construction begins.
