26 Thanksgiving holidays HINT: Recycling an old garment may be a waste of time, if you do

not evaluate the garment's poten-tial first. Recycling projects require thought, planning, and an invest-ment of time and sewing skills. Before you tackle a major recycling

project, try on your garment and study it carefully to determine its recycling potential. Ask yourself: 1. What keeps you from wearing

the item of clothing now?

2. What does it need -- refitting. a change in length, a new neckline 3. Does the garment design lend itself to restyling into a current fashion item?

4. Is the fabric worth using? Is it worn at stress points or pulling at

seams?
5. Do you have the time. patience, and skills to complete the

6. Will this restyling save money?
7. Is it worth it? Will the final

result be worth the investment of time and skill?

8. Will you enjoy the restyling project as a creative challenge? These questions can help you

evaluate your garment in light of three main factors that determine a garment's recycling potential: 1) fabric type, 2) fabric condition, and
