"This means calling an emergency squad for transportation or driving the person to the hospital." She listed the following signs of heart

--Prolonged heavy pressure or squeezing pain in the center of the chest behind the breastbone.

-Pain spreading to the shoulder. arm, neck, or jaw.
--Pain or discomfort followed by

weating, nausea, vomiting, or shortness of breath.
