Paul Tournier, a Swiss psychiatrist, once told of a woman who worked for an international organization. People came and went all day long in her office. But she had no friends and seldom went out of the building where she worked and lived. In her room at night, she always turned on her radio before going to bed, just to hear the sound of a human voice the announcer's -- say, "And now I bid you a pleasant good night."

Those who are acquainted with the scene at singles bars (I am not) will tell you that some of the loneliest people in the world join the milling crowds there night after night. Psychologists say that such




