Suppose that you are the owner of a small, incorporated business. You are short of cash, and can't get a loan from a bank, so you borrow from an individual. This lender is suspicious of your bad credit rating, and really puts it to you for interest - charges you 50 percent interest for a short term loan.

In desperation, you take the can. However, when the time comes to repay, you don't have the money, and the lender takes you to

You defend yourself on the grounds that an interest rate of 50 per cent is higher than the law allows. That is, you argue to the court that the lender is guilty of

wsury.
Who wins?

Your argument is to no avail. If you as an individual had borrowed at an illegally high rate, you would have a good defense. But it was your corporation which borrowed the money. Under N.C. law, the defense of usury is not available to a business corporation.
