

The New Jersey, the first of the four "Iowa" Class battleships to reenter active service, was recently recommissioned at the Long Beach Naval Shipyard.

The battleship was originally commissioned in May 1943 for use in WWII. Following the war, the massive ship was decommissioned and "mothballed" until it was reactivated for use during the Korean and Vietnam conflict.

Plans for reactivation of the New Jersey began in 1981 and were followed by an extensive overhaul period. Advanced radar and communications systems were installed, and "Harpoon" and "Tomahawk" missiles were added to the ship's arsenal, which includes nine 16inch guns and 20 5-inch guns.

The New Jersey is 887 feet long and carries a crew of approximately 70 officers and 1,600 enlisted members. It is capable of carrying helicopters and "Harrier" vertical take-off aircraft.
