Raefordites Named To UNC-W Dean's List

To qualify for academic distinction at UNCW, students carrying 12 to 14 hours must earn a quality point average of 3.5 or better with no grade lower than a B. Students carrying 15 or more hours must earn a 3.2 average with no grade less than B.

Raeford Students Named To NC State Fall Dean's List

Two Hoke County were among 2,118 students who earned Dean's List honors during the fall semester at North Carolina State University.

Robert W. Moses, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W.L. Moses of Raeford, maintained a perfect "A" record in civil engineering.

Randy D. Ashburn, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A.R. Ashburn of 218 Wright Street in Raeford, had a "B" average or better also in civil engineering.

Students from 94 North Carolina counties, 30 other states outside of North Carolina, and 19 foreign countries were among the students to achieve the honor.

To make the Dean's List, students must earn an academic average of 3.25 or higher if they are carrying 15 or more hours, or 3.5 or better if they are carrying 12 to 14 hours.

Chancellor Bruce R. Poulton made special note of the 325 students who achieved perfect 4.0 grade point averages for the semester. Moses was one of the 295 who were from North Carolina.
