sweating, nausea, vomiting, or shortness of breath.

These symptoms may subside and then return, but don't wait. Get the person to a hospital emergency room at once," Kelly said.

Public education on heart attack, stroke, high blood pressure, and other form of heart disease is one of the programs supported by the Heart Fund, Mrs. Kelly pointed out.

Other programs cover research, professional education and training, and community service. All Heart Fund contributions

are tax deductible.




