Both revisions involved the repayment of funds," Green said. "I think we can take care of that in this application," he added.

Last year over 200 municipalities and counties applied for the ap-proximately \$28 million in funds that were up for grabs in the state. Only about 40 projects were funded last year.

In further business, councilmen voted to spend \$48,000 on new equipment for a city sewage pump station.

Four new pumps, motors and a control board will be purchased with the approved funds to replace old machinery presently at the station.

"I think we need to spend the money. From what I understand, if we lose one of those pumps we could be in serious trouble," Councilman Joe Upchurch said.

Councilmen also approved a \$1,000 contribution to the Hoke Heritage Hobnob festival that is slated for May 4 and 5 in Raeford.


