Candles were lit by Johnny Boyles of Shannon, brother of the groom, and Donald Meyers of Lexington, brother of the bride.

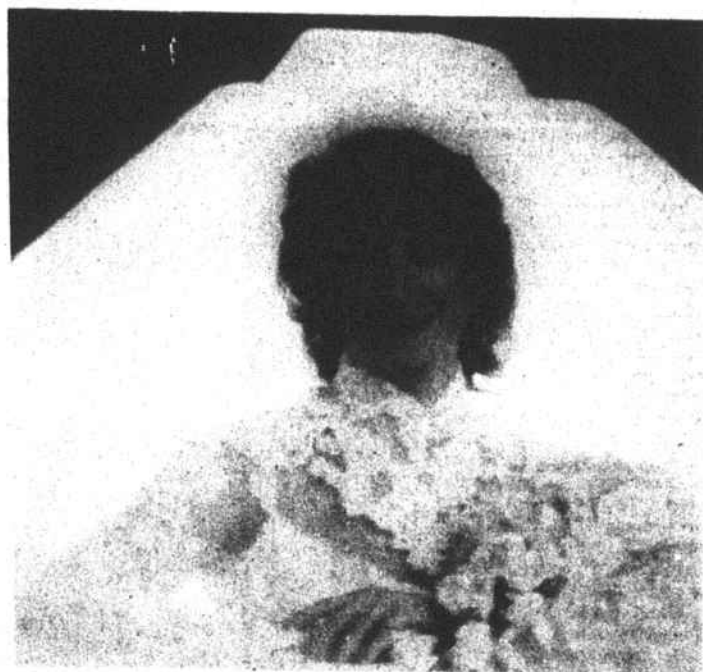
