The wedding was directed by Mrs. Mary Archie McNeill.

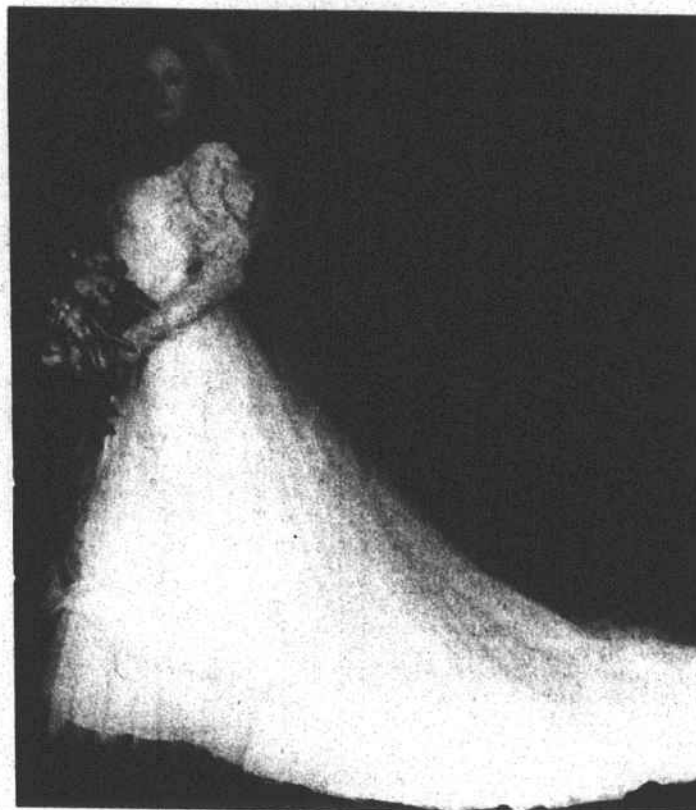
