### CP&L wire stolen for fourth time

Carolina Power and Light (CP&L), for the fourth time this month, has reported wire stolen

A CP&L representative reported on June 9 that 1,000 feet of copper and 500 feet of aluminum wire was taken from poles on Highway 211, a Hoke County Sheriff's report

Again, on June 12, the company reported another 1,500 feet of copper wire missing on Highway 211.

Last week, there were two other reported wire thefts from the power company's poles.

CP&L reported the wire to be

worth about \$55. In another matter, the break-in

of a Sunbeam Bread truck last Thursday was reported to Raeford Police.

Taken from the truck was about \$8 worth of cakes and pastry, Chief Leonard Wiggins said.

Police arrested Gene Dukes in connection with the alleged theft.

A spokesperson for the Sheriff's Department said that Dukes was not in the Hoke County Jail, but has been sent to Dorothea Dix Hospital for psychiatric evalua-

Two cars, traveling down Highway 211, had wind shields broken out from rocks apparently thrown from the Highway 401 overpass, police reports say

The destroyed wind shields were reportedly worth about \$500.

A breaking and entering was reported to police last week at Hoke County High School.

Jessey Josey, a teacher at the school, reported that she had gone to lunch and left her pocketbook in her classroom.

When she returned, her purse was missing, reports say

The pocketbook and its contents were recovered later that day, reports say.

The matter is still under investigation, Wiggins said.

## Some Hoke tobacco appears damaged

By Ed Miller About 40 acres of young tobacco plants in Hoke County have shown symptoms of suffering from contaminated fertilizers, County Extension Agent Willie Featherstone said last week.

Currently, there are three types of Gold Dollar Tobacco fertilizers made by the W.R. Grace Company that have been found to be contaminated by dicamba, a broad leaf herbicide, Featherstone said.

According to the North Carolina Department of Agriculture, tests are ongoing to determine whether other grades of fertilizers made by W.R. Grace are contaminated.

"There is not much (contamination) in proportion to the amount of tobacco we have in the county," Featherstone said.

There are about 1,300 total acres of tobacco in Hoke County.

The 40 apparently contaminated acres of the county are in the Quewhiffle area; however, Featherstone said that, although

the plants show the symptoms of contamination, soil samples have determined no dicamba content.

The two farmers whose plants show signs of contamination did use W.R. Grace fertilizer, said

It can be concluded that there may be a low concentration of dicamba in the soil that has not shown up in tests yet, Featherstone

The extension agent added that the tobacco, now thought to be contaminated, is still young and may recover to produce a good

Dicamba stays in the soil about 60 days and is considered one of safest chemicals on the market because a grower can harvest a field that has been treated with the herbicide and replant a short season crop with little or no danger to the second crop's yield, said Featherstone.

He recommended that farmers

who find signs of damage document yields from past years and costs to determine if dicamba has had any effect on yields.

Featherstone also recommended that the grower notify the Department of Agriculture and save a bag of the fertilizer for analysis.


James E. Thames James Edward Thames, grocery store operator, died Sunday in Moore Memorial Hospital in Pinehurst.
