Congressmen, when it comes to Congressmen, have looked far down the road and made sure it's paved all the way.



## Women trying harder than men

Today's woman thinks she tries harder and is more successful than the average man in her efforts to improve her health.

That's what a two-year attitude study of the health habits of more

than 5,000 men and women found. Maurice Mittelmark, assistant professor of epidemiology at the University of Minnesota, who con-ducted the study, said he believes the women's perception represents 'reality.''

For example, more than half the women who considered themselves overweight said they changed their diets and were eating less.

For about one in three overweight men said he had done the same.

"My conclusion," Mittlemark told the Health Insurance Association of America, "is that women are trying harder than men; whether or not they are successful, we simply do not know.


