In that precinct, 799 voters out of 1,239 registered marked

In other races, Hoke County maintained its record of going for Democratic Party candidates.

Unlike the state and nation, all of that party's slate were victorious in Hoke County.

Incumbent Congressman William G. Hefner was successful in carrying Hoke County and narrowly defeating Republican Harris Blake for the Eighth Congressional District seat.

Hefner carrried Hoke County in better than a two-to-one margin,

garnering 3,669 votes to Blake's 1,600. With 222 of 223 precincts reporting on Wednesday, Hefner had

recieved 99,443 votes to Blake's 94,841. In other races, Hoke County was one of the bright spots for Democrat Walter Mondale. Mondale and running mate Geraldine Ferraro captured the Hoke County tally with 3,213 votes to Presi-

dent Ronald Reagan's 2,449. Governor Jim Hunt also carried Hoke County in his unsuccessful

bid to unseat incumbent Sen. Jesse Helms. Hunt received 3,655 votes to Helm's 1,913

In the race for governor, Rufus Edmisten failed to carry the state against Republican Congressman Jim Martin, but he did win Hoke County 3,734 votes to Martin's 1,800.

Lt. Governor-elect Bob Jordan had a wider margin in the county

than most major statewide candidates. Jordan received 3,805 to 1,108 for Republican challenger John

Although they did not win any races in the county, Republicans

picked up cross-over votes in every race. Democratic candidate Lacy Thornburg out polled his opponent

here almost 3 to 1 in his bid for state Attorney General. The former Superior Court judge carried Hoke County 3,996 to

1,103 on his way to winning a statewide victory. Only 487 Republican's are registered in the county, but all major

candidates of that party received more than 1,000 votes. In the balloting Tuesday, about 5,748 voters out of the 9,050

registered went to the polls in Hoke County. Every precinct, except Blue Springs, had better than a 50% turn-

In Blue Springs, 49% of those registered voted.

Democratic state House of Representatives candidates Danny DeVane, Sidney Locks and Pete Hasty, along with state Sen. David Parnell were unopposed in their bids Tuesday for re-election.

Hoke County Commissioners Wyatt Upchurch and Neil McPhatter also received rubber stamps from the local voters.

McPhaul and Cobb were placed in jail under \$10,000 bond each, but that bond was posted the same day, Harris said.
