During the last fiscal year, which ended on June 30, retail sales increased in Hoke County by \$2.9 million over the previous year, figures recently released by the state Department of Revenue show.

During the 1983-84 year, sales in the county soared to \$50.35 million, which was up from \$47.4 week.

During the quarter ending June 30, the city received \$17,853 and the county \$103,177 in half-cent sales tax revenues.

For the first quarter of this year, which ended September 30, the city received \$19,797 and the county \$110,785.

Hoke County budgeted \$180,000 in one-half cent revenue for the general operating account, which is 40% of the gross amount received. The 60% balance of the money goes to the Hoke County schools for a building program.

Based on the first quarter's figures, Hoke County will receive \$177,256 for the year and the schools \$265,884 in half-cent sales tax refunds. Both amounts are slightly less than what was budgeted, but county Finance Director Charles Davis said last week he anticipates the collections in other quarters will show gains to make up the differences.

On the other hand, Raeford only budgeted \$35,000 in one-half cent tax revenue for the year, and based on the first quarter's figures, the city will receive \$79,188, or \$44,188 in unbudgeted income.

"That's when you will see lines coming down too," Councilman Vardell Hedgpeth said.
