Assault charges swapped after high-speed chase, tussle

A Hoke County Sheriff's deputy
was led on a high speed chase, assaulted at chase's end and then accused of beating up the suspect, according to sheriff's reports.

Deputy Ronnie Lowry had not been charged as of Tuesday of assault after the November 21 incident, according to Sheriff Dave

Barrington.
A Hoke County resident, Johnny Lee Scott, has been charged with resisting arrest and assaulting an officer, reports say.

Scott was released the same day of arrest under \$1,200 bond, Clerk of Court's records show.

At 12:05 a.m., Lowry was leav-ing Farm Chemical Corperation on routine patrol when he observed a car travelling very fast down rural road 1432.

The car was coming from

Arabia and ran the stop sign at rural road 1105, reports say.

Lowry proceded from Farm Chemical, down 1105, in the same direction of the car.

When the deputy got to Dundarrach, he noticed the car on the other side of N.C. 20.

According to the deputy's report, he then turned on his blue light and siren and went after the

Even at speeds up to 85 and 90 miles per hour, the car would not stop, reports say.

Shortly thereafter, the car made two more turns then stopped in a driveway.

When Scott got out of the car, he was swaying and smelled of

alcohol, reports say.

Lowry asked the driver for his operator's license and attempted to arrest him on driving while impaired charges, but was told that Scott was not going anywhere,

reports say.
Scott then turned to go in his house and Lowry "grabbed him by the arm," reports say.

The man then turned and hit the deputy and wrapped his arms around Lowry's waist in an apparent attempt to take his gun, Lowry said in the report.

At some point during the struggle, the pair fell on the ground, and Scott hit his head on a flower pot, Barrington said.

Lowry could not get handcuffs on the man.

Joe Scott, father of the subject then came out of the house and told Lowry to "leave now," reports say.

Lowry then went back to his car and called for assistance.

As he was giving directions to Deputy Sergeant Billy Morrison, Lowry saw Scott through a window getting something out of a

Fearing a gun, the deputy back-

ed down the road about 100 feet,

reports say. When Morrison arrived on the scene, he saw Scott leave his house through a side door and run into the woods nearby.

Lowry and Morrison looked for Scott until Major Jimmy Riley, Sergeant Ronnie Odom and Deputy Joshua Brown arrived.

They joined the search for a short time, but it was decided to obtain warrants for arrest and return later.

At 3:02 a.m., a call was received by the Sheriff's Department saying that a man was being treated at Cape Fear Valley Medical Center. The man was saying he had been

assaulted by a Hoke County depu-

According to reports, the man turned out to be Scott. Morrison and Lowry went to Fayetteville to get him, and Scott tried to hit Lowry again at the

hospital, reports say. Finally, at the request of his father, Scott surrendered and went

with the deputies. He was brought back to Hoke County and arrested, reports say.


