

New Faberge VP named

Don Hammes has been appointed recently as Vice President-Manufacturing for Faberge, Raeford plant.

Hammes has been associated with McGregor for 25 years and comes to Faberge from the Anvil Knitwear Division of the company which operates two plants in North Carolina and two plants in South Carolina where he also served as Vice President-Manufacturing.

Hammes is married and has two sons, ages 23 and 16. He has been a resident of the Carolinas for 15 years.

McGregor Corporation acquired control of Faberge in March, 1984 and since that time has been in the

process of consolidating the two diverse companies.

The consolidated company has 7,000 employees working in the United States and (eight) foreign operations of Faberge (Canada, United Kingdom, France, Italy, West Germany, Mexico, Australia and New Zealand). It also has licenses for McGregor/Faberge in over 40 countries around the world.

Latin teacher, Mrs. Gore dies

Former Hoke County High School Latin teacher Mrs. Annie Horner Gore died last Thursday evening at the Open Arms Rest Home in Raeford.

Mrs. Gore, who was 82, had been in ill-health in recent years.

Before retiring in 1966, Mrs. Gore taught English and Latin in the high school for 34 years and served on the Hoke County Democratic Committee for 27 years.

She was named Hoke County Democratic Woman of the Year in 1962. Mrs. Gore was a long-term member of the Raeford Woman's Club and served as president of the organization. The club's yearbook was dedicated to her in 1968.

In addition to her duties for the Woman's Club, Mrs. Gore also served as president of the Raeford-Hoke PTA and the American Legion Auxiliary and was on the

Board of Directors for the State Mothers Association.

Mrs. Gore was the former Annie Virginia Horner of Cumberland County and came to Hoke County in 1937 when she married Raeford attorney Arthur D. Gore. She had a A.B. Degree from Meredith College and had done graduate work at the University of North Carolina and Columbia University.

She was listed in *Outstanding American Poets* of 1938 and her work was included in *Silver Echoes*, a poetry anthology of winners of an annual literature contest.

Mrs. Gore also appeared in the 1969 edition of *Personalities of the South*.

In a 1968 edition of *The News-Journal*, it was noted that: "As a school teacher of some three decades, she won the respect and

love of the boys and girls through her dedication to the work and her successful efforts to arouse and maintain the enthusiasm of students, whether the subject be English or Latin."

Funeral services were held Saturday morning in the Raeford Cemetery by the Rev. Dr. John Ropp of the Raeford Presbyterian Church, where Mrs. Gore had been an active member.

She is survived by two sons: Arthur D. Gore Jr. of Denver, Colorado and Hal Gore of Chipley, Florida; four daughters: Mrs. Elizabeth Tingle of Fayetteville; Mrs. Gwyn Senior of Chapel Hill; Mrs. Fannette Ollendorff of Helsinki, Finland and Mrs. Ann Hosteler of Raeford; 18 grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Hefner sworn in for sixth term

Congressman Bill Hefner was sworn in for his sixth term in Congress last week.
