

Check out door-to-door pitches

When someone raps on the door with an offer you can't refuse, take a few minutes to think it over. It's true that many good products are sold door-to-door. It's also true that some salesfolk can be a problem

If you're thinking about buying something expensive, such as an appliance or house repairs, take your time.

If the sales person convinces you that you really do need this product, check with local dealers first. You may find you can get the same product locally at lower costs.

If you do decide to sign on the dotted line, remember your rights. For example, if you sign a contract that calls for credit payments, the seller must give you a form you can return within three days -- if you change your mind.

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He must also return your downpayment.

Women and Wills

A woman needs a will and for good reason. For no matter if you are a wife, mother or single head of household, you own property, you probably have a car, savings or other bank accounts, insurance and personal items such as jewelry or furniture. That means you have something of value to leave others when you die. If you don't have a will, your estate will be distributed by the state. And since the State has a set procedure to follow, it may not distribute your property as you would have liked.

Wouldn't it be better to make sure your husband, children and others get the things you want them to have? That means having a will.

You can also use your will to name a guardian for your children and to name the executor of your estate.

Some tree growers miss federal tax incentives

Many forest landowners pay too much federal income tax because they fail to take advantage of the legal deductions, credits, and preferential tax treatments which are incentives to increase timber production, according to Rick Hamilton, Extension Forestry Specialist, North Carolina State University.

For instance, under a new federal law, landowners may claim a 10% tax credit and a seven-year write-off of out-of-pocket reforestation costs of up to \$10,000 per year. The law applies to reforestation

expenses incurred after December 31, 1979

Individuals, corporations, partnerships and estates are eligible, but trusts are not.

Costs of site preparation, seeds or seedlings, labor and tools, and equipment depreciation are includ-Several landowners have sold

timber in the last year and these people also can cash in by paying less income tax. Timber is a capital asset which if

owned for over one year and sold. qualifies for long term capital gains income tax treatment. Under capital gains, only 40% of the net long term capital gains is taxed as income.

Most landowners would qualify particularly if they sell timber infrequently.

Landowners selling timber frequently also qualify, but they should consult a tax expert and forester before selling timber to be sure that their method of selling timber meets the IRS requirements.

In addition, any costs of selling the timber as well as the land-owner's original cost in the timber are subtracted when calculating gain.

Annual deductions of forest hanagement ~ expenses ~# claimed even if no forestry income is realized during the year. If a

landowner itemized deductions, costs of short life tools, equipment maintenance, salaries, wages, fees and equipment depreciation must be taken in the year incurred.

Taxes, interest payments, protection costs, timber stand improvement costs and timber insurance premiums may also be claimed as deductions each year. However, these latter expenses need not be claimed annually if the landowner does not need deductions. In that case, the landowner should keep a record of these costs, as they may be subtracted from the sale price of the timber when it is sold and will result in a reduced taxable income.

This will give residents an opportunity to ask questions about the survey and to receive one for your personal use.

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
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
