Woman charged with stabbing

Raeford woman, Ozella McLaughlin White, was out of jail on \$5,000 bond Tuesday after be-ing charged with the Friday night stabbing of a county man. On March 8, the Hoke County

Sheriff's Department was called and alerted to a stabbing, according to reports.

Upon arrival, deputies found Roscoe Torrence face down in a road.

After checking to make sure that it was safe to do so, deputies rolled him over to discover a stab wound in his upper right chest, Hoke Detective Weaver Patterson's reports said.

Torrence was unconscious when deputies arrived, reports say. The man was taken to Scotland

Memorial Hospital. According to reports, a knife with an eight inch blade was used

to inflict the wounds. White is scheduled for a first ap-

Jobs programs offer training

Employers in Hoke County can get labor at reduced initial costs in exchange for training through a program offered by the North Carolina Employment Security

Commission (ESC). A recently implemented pro-gram called "Youth Tryout Employment" will allow employers in the private sector to hire a high school senior, for 20 hours per week, for nothing for the first 250 hours, said Sandra Moss, Raeford ESC Branch Office

At the end of the training period, the employer must hire the worker as a regular employee, Moss added.

At minimum wage, \$3.35 per hour, an employer can save over \$837

Any type of business can use this service as long as it is not state or federally supported, she said.

"There is not even that much paperwork involved," said Moss.

"In fact, there is no paperwork for the employer," she said. To qualify for the Youth Tryout

program, a worker must be a high school senior who has had 50 hours "pre-employment skills training," or vocational education, said Moss.

The ESC will send a number of applicants so employers may interview and screen in a normal fashion, said Moss.
